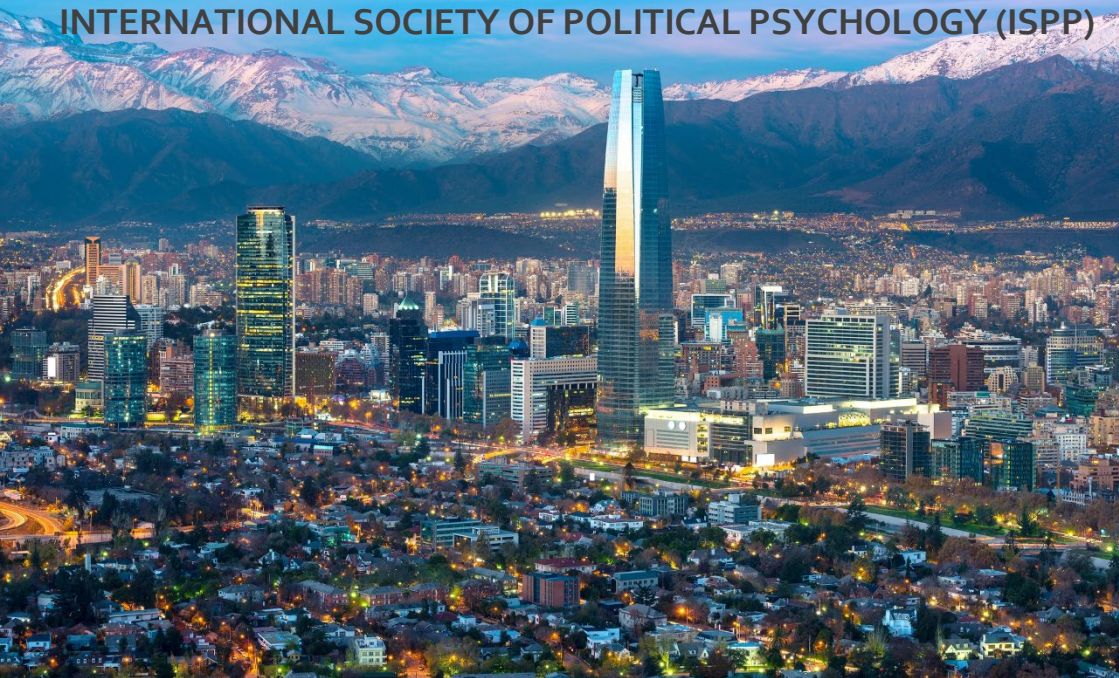

Places of Interest

La Moneda Palace is the seat of Chilean government. The President of the Republic and the most important ministries operate there. You can register on the official site for access to guided tours Monday through Friday between 9 am and 5 pm. A must-see is the guard changing ceremony, which takes place every two days at 10 am on weekdays, and 11 am on weekends, in Plaza de la Constitución. Address: Moneda s/n. Santiago Centro, Santiago, Región Metropolitana. METRO STATION: La Moneda, L1. 13-15 minutes by car.

Plaza de Armas was built as the center of the city at the time of its founding in 1541, and today is one of its most important cultural spaces. There you can see historical buildings as the Cathedral of Santiago, the Chilean Post Office, the National History Museum, and the present building of the Municipality of Santiago. METRO STATION: Plaza de Armas, L5. 13-15 minutes by car.

The Central Market is one of the oldest markets in the country. There you will find a huge variety of fish and seafood, as well as restaurants with exquisite Chilean cuisine. It is a place full of movement where you can take very good pictures. Address: San Pablo 967, Santiago Centro. METRO STATION: Puente Cal y Canto, L2. 16-17 minutes by car.

Chilean Pre-Columbian Art Museum. This museum has one of the most important samples of natives of Chile and Latin America. It was created in the 1980s, and occupies the old Palacio de la Real Aduana, a prominent building of the colonial era. Address: Bandera 361, Santiago Centro. METRO STATION: Plaza de Armas, L5. 16-18 minutes by car.

The Memory and Human Rights Museum is a space designed to give visibility to the human rights violations committed by the State of Chile between 1973 and 1990; to dignify the victims and their families; and to stimulate reflection and debate on the importance of respect and tolerance for these events to never recur. Address: Avenida Matucana 501, Quinta Normal. METRO STATION: Quinta Normal, L5. 16-18 minutes by car.

The San Cristóbal Hill stands at about 880 meters tall, serving as a key landmark. From its summit, visitors can enjoy breathtaking panoramic views of Santiago and the Andes. At its peak lies the Sanctuary of the Immaculate Conception, featuring a striking statue of the Virgin Mary. You can also visit fantastic attractions such as the Cable Car and the Funicular, located near the hill. This site is a favorite among both locals and tourists, who visit for outdoor activities like hiking and biking. METRO STATION: Baquedano L1 and L51. 8-10 minutes by car (the entrance on Pedro de Valdivia Avenue is the nearest from the Hotel).

From the President

Welcome to the ISPP Santiago 2024 Conference from ISPP President, Catarina Kinnvall

Dear Colleagues, it is a great pleasure to welcome you all to the ISPP Annual Meeting in Santiago, Chile and to our first conference ever to be held in the Southern hemisphere.

The program chairs have created a wonderful program, consisting of panels, roundtables, posters, keynotes, meetings, ceremonies, and receptions, with presenters from close to 50 countries across the world. It is my belief that this reflects an increasingly diverse and global political psychology community. The program is put together amidst a world in which conflict and crises define the headlines and lives of so many of us and where it is becoming increasingly difficult to know what tomorrow holds. But it is also a world in which our discipline, political psychology, is more pertinent than ever to try to make sense of it all and to find psychological and political tools for understanding, analyzing, changing, and possibly resisting a world in which conflict and crises seem to have become the norm.

I would like to thank all involved, program and section chairs, the ISPP leadership, and the Central Office for making it possible to organize the conference in the beautiful city of Santiago. I would also like to thank all who submitted papers, panels, posters, and roundtables and registered for the conference. We are aware that not all of those submitting could make the conference for a variety of reasons, which is unfortunate, but we are very happy to see more than 420 registrations. Not only do we have presenters from across the world, but we also have representation across the social sciences and humanities (political science, psychology, history, communication, and sociology, among others), making the conference into a truly interdisciplinary event.

We are looking forward to an event that brings together so many old and new friends and colleagues, where some have attended ISPP conferences for years, while for others it is their first time. A warm welcome to you all. We are looking forward to memorable ideas and presentations, to discussions, debates, feedback, and mentoring – all of which will enrich, challenge, and develop new theoretical, methodological, and empirical approaches and make our discipline stronger. Thanks for attending and sharing your ideas and knowledge.

Our conference theme, 'Dismantling Democracy: Insecurity, Emotions and Authoritarian Populism', has received 86 submissions, of which 13 are full panels, which speaks to the urgency of the topic. It also speaks to the concern many of us have with issues related to the political and psychological roots of conflict and increased authoritarianism, and their impact on democratic and non-democratic societies. As noted in the call for papers, understanding the

affective and emotional appeal of authoritarian populism is important for appreciating the wider consequences of social injustices, climate change, and illiberal reforms and how these work in relation to leaders, voters, and audiences across the world. This is reflected in the panels, roundtables, posters, and keynotes, where many engage with *The Political Psychology of Populism and authoritarianism*, but also with the emotional and structural dynamics of democratic decline from a broader perspective.

We have also received a great number of submissions for the other sections, not least political behavior and public opinion, but also the sections on conflict and violence, intergroup relations, social inequality, race and gender, political culture, international relations, and more. It is moreover with great pleasure I note the submissions to our Spanish and Portuguese section, allowing for presentations from local participants and on issues related to the local context. Taken together, we are happy to encounter such a diversity in topics, theories, and methodologies, looking forward to interacting, discover and engage with your presentations.

To learn more about the local political context of Chile and related to the conference theme, please join us for the **keynote presentation** by **Professor Elizabeth Lira**, Alberto Hurtado University, Chile. Elizabeth will speak on: *Reparation and Recognition of victims of human rights violations*, reflecting on the process of recognition and reparation of the victims and their families as part of the policies of the transition from dictatorship to democratic government in Chile. Please also join us for our second **keynote presentation** by **Professor Agustín Espinosa**, Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú. Agustín will talk on: *Democratic Weakening from Citizen Decision-Making: Political Moral Laxity as a Consequence of Perverse Political Socialization*, highlighting how the high prevalence of structural violence, corruption and systemic malfunctioning in the case of some Latin American societies, seem to produce certain forms of political moral laxity in citizens' reasonings.

In relation to the conference theme, I invite you to attend the roundtable on '**Authoritarian Populism as the New Normal? Psychoanalytical Approaches**', where this 'new normal' in contemporary politics is addressed from various psychoanalytical approaches, highlighting its emotional, political, and economic dimensions. Paul Nesbitt-Larking will chair the session.

In addition, the **Early Career Scholars** have created three roundtables where scholars from political science and psychology, from different career stages, are expected to meet to discuss opportunities and challenges during career trajectories and examine strategies for publishing doctoral dissertations and research articles. The **Caucus of Concerned Scholars** has organized the session "An Intellectual framework for hot-button issues: Seeing the humanity in 'the other'", in which scholars will address **how to help people talk and**

work civilly about difficult issues, such as specific conflicts or long-term, endemic issues, such as racism, genderism, ethnic and religious prejudice and hatred, and homophobia. The **Scholars Under Threat Roundtable** session organized by our Scholars Under Threat (SUT) Committee invites our attendees to learn more about our twinning program, share experiences, and participate in the SUT initiatives. We also invite you to join the **poster session** on Friday, July 5, where colleagues will present their recent research on a range of topics.

The conference provides space for celebrating and honoring achievements. Please join our **Awards Ceremony**, where we show our gratitude for the achievements of old and new members of our society who have contributed significantly to the promotion of political psychology scholarship around the world. Our Lifetime Achievement Awards Committee chaired by Kristen Monroe and our ISPP Output Awards Committees chaired by Amanda Bittner, Allison Anoll, Kathleen Powers, Eva Green, Shelley McKeown Jones and Sammyh Khan reviewed nominations and selected the recipients of our ten ISPP awards. WELCOME TO THE 47th ANNUAL MEETING OF THE INTERNATIONAL SOCIETY OF POLITICAL PSYCHOLOGY!

Dear Delegates,

We are very excited to welcome you to this year's 47th Annual Meeting of the International Society of Political Psychology. We are delighted that we are able to hold our conference here in Santiago, a city not only of spectacular beauty, surrounded by the towering Andes Mountains, but one of great interest to those who study political contestation, mass social movements and social transformation.

Chile has just finished a year of marking the 50th anniversary of General Pinochet's authoritarian military coup, which overthrew the democratically elected socialist government of Salvador Allende and lasted for seventeen brutal years, characterised by political repression, torture, executions, and disappearances. For many, the political struggles and resistance of the Chilean people became a symbol around the world. In the words of one of its most celebrated citizens, poet Pablo Neruda, "You can cut all the flowers, but you cannot keep spring from coming."

The conference theme for this year is "Dismantling Democracy: Insecurity, Emotions and Authoritarian Populism" – most fitting for 2024 which has been called the "year of Elections", with approximately 2 billion voters facing elections across the globe, the most ever in world history. With recent big populist wins in Argentina and the Netherlands in 2023, varying forms of populism are on the ballot in 2024 in the United Kingdom, the European Parliament, India, the United States, South Africa, Russia, Indonesia, Mexico and Taiwan, to name but a few. In Africa, there may be as many as seventeen countries who will hold elections this year.

Meanwhile, war is raging – not only in Gaza, and in Ukraine, but in Sudan, Myanmar, Yemen, DR Congo, Ethiopia and elsewhere – and our planet continues to warm up. As we gather together for these few days in this beautiful city, presenting our research and listening to that of our colleagues, we have our work cut out for us. What can we, as Political Psychologists, contribute to understanding the multiple crises with which we are now confronted? For, to paraphrase, interpreting the world is insufficient; the point is to change it, collectively, re-energizing our commitment to realising a more just and humane future.

Presidential Address: Grievances as Loss: Ontological Insecurity, Postcolonial Melancholia, and Masculinism

Catarina Kinnvall (Lund University, Sweden)

This presentation will address the particular narratives and discourses that respond to increased feelings of uncertainty, anxiety and fear, so called 'ontological insecurities', and their connections to postcolonial imaginaries of increasingly authoritarian polities. I discuss how such narratives and discourses are emotionally governed and psychoanalytically resonant in their focus on imaginary pasts and futures and how they are accelerated by the ubiquity of hybrid media that have allowed for increasingly populist authoritarian forces to efficiently spread their emotional messages. In the presentation I spell out how specific grievances and attachments are being rethought, re-justified and reimagined through postcolonial pasts and practices, and how narratives of 'trauma', 'nationhood' and 'masculinism' explain the desires, violence and ruptures involved in postcolonial bordering and gendered subject formation. In addition, I discuss how, and to what extent, resistance is possible.

Keynote 1: Reparation and Recognition of Victims of Human Rights Violations
Elizabeth Lira (Alberto Hurtado University, Chile)

The year 2023 marked the 50th anniversary of the military coup in Chile that led to a 17-year dictatorship characterized by human rights violations. The violence resulted in thousands of victims, prisoners and tortured, victims of forced disappearance and extrajudicial executions. The talk will be a reflection on the process of recognition and reparation of the victims and their families as part of the policies of the transition from dictatorship to democratic government through the establishment of truth, justice, and memory, which today constitute transdisciplinary fields of research, professional practices, and political action.

Saturday July 6, 6:15pm – 7:15pm

Keynote 2: Democratic Weakening from Citizen Decision-Making: Political Moral Laxity as a Consequence of Perverse Political Socialization

Agustín Espinosa (Pontificia Universidad Católica del Perú)

Political structures and dynamics characterized by a high prevalence of structural violence, corruption and systemic malfunctioning, as in the case of some Latin American societies, seem to produce in citizens reasonings such as “all politicians are the same so it is acceptable to vote for a candidate who steals, but do the work” or “it is right to vote for those politicians we consider as the ‘lesser evil’”. The above shows that the political systems to which we are exposed act as socializing forces with a potential impact on how we will position ourselves before the public, the collective, the private and the individual as dimensions of the political. Types of reasoning such as those mentioned previously have been systematized and have allowed the coining of the concept of Political Moral Laxity, which comprises “a set of beliefs and political attitudes of citizens who tolerate, and even favor, dishonest, transgressive and corrupt actions carried out by politicians and authorities”. Although these actions could individually or collectively benefit those who accept them, they can cause harm or damage to other citizens and society in general, establishing tensions between the private and the public, where the latter is constantly left aside. This presentation will emphasize the social conditions in which Political Moral Laxity occurs and gains strength, as well as, the potential consequences it has for democracy.

The International Society of Political Psychology (ISPP) invites scholars from different disciplines (political science, psychology, international relations, history, sociology, economics, anthropology, media and communication, gender studies, and more) to share ideas, theories, and current research on political and psychological processes that address the interplay between different types of identity (national, ethnic/racial, partisan, etc.) and the consequences of such interplay for democratic values and practice, with an eye to how we might protect robust, socially diverse democratic societies.

Throughout the globe, democracy and democratic norms have come under strain. This can be seen in the rise of authoritarian-populist leaders and regimes in societies as diverse as the United States, Hungary, Türkiye, Brazil, India, and elsewhere. But is also evident in opinion research showing increased willingness to abandon democratic values in the face of political loss, declining trust in democratic institutions, and varying degrees of increased tolerance for political violence.

The strains facing democracy in the present era often have their roots in social identity and conflicts linked to important social identities—nation, race, religious, ideology, and partisanship, to name a few. These include conflicts about whether national identity should be construed in a restrictive or expansive fashion in the face of demographic change, conflicts with arising from longstanding inequalities linked to group identities as varied as race, religion, and class, and conflicts between competing cultural visions in rapidly changing societies. When these identity-linked conflicts begin to overlap heavily with the identities that organized political competition—such as partisanship and ideology—the potential for democratic strain only increases.

PRAGUE July 15 – 18, 2025

Political psychology is uniquely situated to address the nexus between identity, political conflict, and the future of democracy. For the Prague conference, we encourage submissions that address these issues and related phenomena across the globe. The conference will be an opportunity to discuss innovative interdisciplinary research aimed at theorizing, empirically examining, and offering practical solutions to problems faced by democracies as they navigate conflicts linked to core social identities. We invite research that explores the psychological foundations of social and political identity, psychological processes that reinforce—or challenge—the inequalities that often fuel identity-based conflict, and factors that allow robust, socially-diverse democratic societies to flourish. We also invite work that examines the motivations and behaviors of leaders, activists, and citizens who either seek to undermine or preserve and extend democratic institutions.

We extend a warm welcome both to ISPP members and to scholars from all disciplines and countries and from all theoretical and methodological perspectives to submit their academic contributions and research to our conference. All types of submissions (proposals for individual papers, panels, roundtables, and posters) on any topic in political psychology are equally welcome. We encourage the inclusion of discussants for panel proposals.

The conference will offer participants the opportunity to learn from, and interact with, distinguished keynote speakers addressing psychological processes at the interface of nationhood, social identity, and democratic practice. Per longtime ISPP practice, there will be an opportunity to attend a panel discussion with the editors of the Society's flagship journals, *Political Psychology* and *Advances in Political Psychology*. We will also offer mentoring events, networking opportunities for early-career scholars, the Scholars Under Threat Symposium, and prior to the conference, the ISPP Summer Academy.

Roberta Sigel Early Career Scholar Paper Award 2025

The Sigel Award is given to early career scholar authors of the best papers presented at annual meetings in a symposium, paper panel, or poster session.

ISPP first announced this award at its Vancouver meeting in 1996. Professor Sigel, whom the award honors, was a distinguished professor of political science at Rutgers University. She was the author and editor of seven books and many articles and book chapters, mostly in the areas of political socialization and democratic citizenship. She had many leadership roles in the American Political Science Association and has served as program chair, Vice-President and President of ISPP.

All ISPP early career scholars who are current dues paid members of ISPP and had their paper accepted for the 2024 Annual Meeting are eligible to be considered for the award to be presented during the 2025 meeting. Early career scholars are students (graduate or undergraduate) and faculty who received their Ph.D. within the last eight years. Each award carries a cash prize of \$250 USD.

There are two awards with slightly different criteria to accommodate the authorship and publication practices in the various disciplines represented in ISPP:

- The **first** (1) award is given to the best paper written by early career scholars only. In the case of multiple authors, all co-authors must be early career scholars.
- The **second** (2) award is conferred to the best paper with an early career scholar first author. This award allows for a senior scholar co-author.

Please nominate (self-nominations are encouraged) eligible papers only (note all submissions as papers; poster format submissions are not acceptable) and submit them to the email below by **January 15, 2025**. Papers previously submitted to the Sigel Award are not eligible. All submissions will be read by the award committee, consisting of members of the Early Career Committee as well as senior scholars. Two papers will be selected strictly according to scientific excellence and their contribution to research in political psychology.

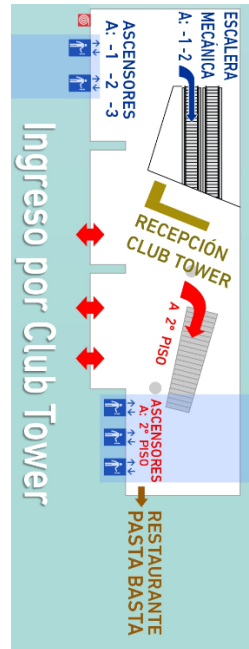
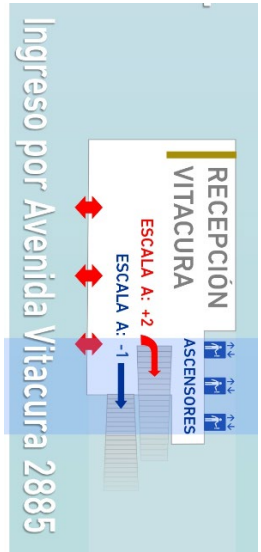

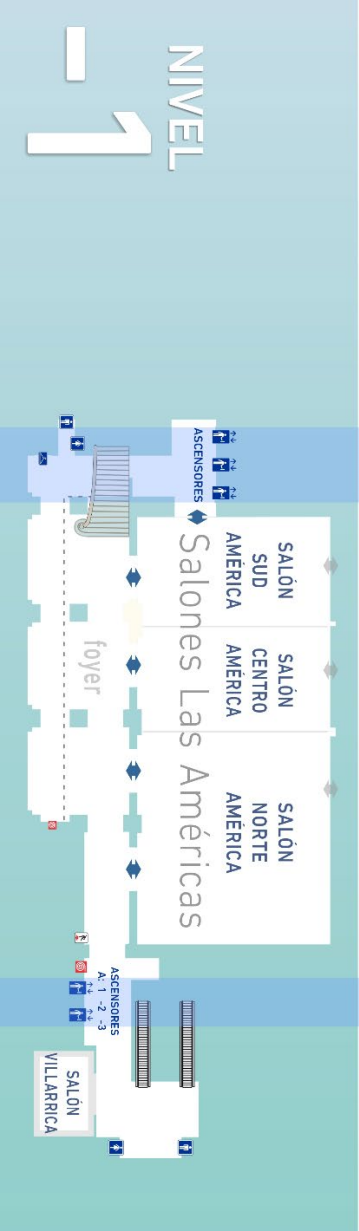
FLOOR PLANS
GROUND FLOOR – LEVEL 0



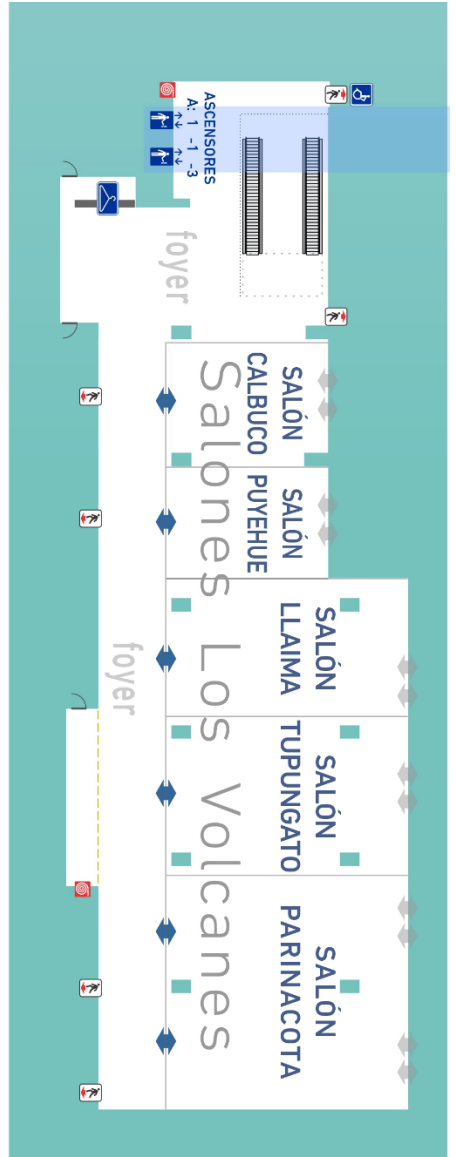
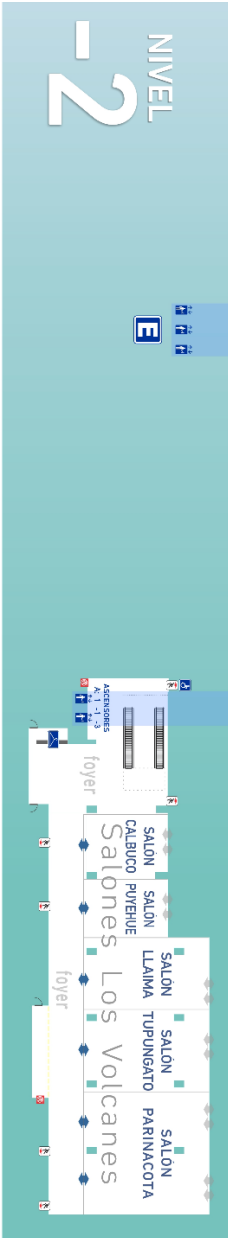
FLOOR PLANS
