About Prague

Prague is a fascinating city full of history, rich culture, amazing architecture, and a top-ranked public transportation system to help you go see it all. Take in all that the “City of a Hundred Spires” has to offer – make sure to extend your stay before or after the ISPP Annual Meeting!

Perhaps consider a Prague Visitor Pass (<https://prague.eu/en/prague-visitor-pass/>), which will allow you access to more than 70 experiences in Prague, plus free admission or special discounts. Or consider one of the guided tours (<https://prague.eu/en/our-guides/>). Plan your trip and what you want to see and do from Prague’s official tourist site at <https://prague.eu/en/>. Explore sites such as the Old Town Hall, the Charles Bridge, the Prague Astronomical Clock, the Prague Castle, and the smallest house in Prague (only 2.25 meters wide!). Take in museums, concerts, and world-renowned opera if you have the time and opportunity.

Prague has something for everyone, and you could easily spend weeks in the city and not do everything that interests you. So plan ahead, build in a bit of extra time during your trip, and enjoy all that you can!

Places of Interest (from <https://prague.eu/en/>)

Old Town Hall An icon of the Czech Republic, a national cultural heritage asset, a symbol of Prague's history and the oldest institution of Czech self-government. At the end of World War II, its underground served as the centre of the Prague Uprising against Nazism and the town hall was almost destroyed by shelling. Not even the bell from 1313 survived, and the altar of the Chapel of the Virgin Mary was also severely damaged. However, the people of Prague repaired their national treasure and today you too can enjoy the Old Town Astronomical Clock with the procession of the twelve apostles, the majesty of the state rooms, the tenderness of the Chapel of the Virgin Mary and the mysterious Romanesque-Gothic underground. Be sure to take a ride to the top of the Town Hall Tower in our space elevator, which offers a beautiful view of the whole of Prague.

Charles Bridge Charles Bridge is one of the most beautiful and photographed monuments in the world. It is guarded by thirty statues and sculptures of saints. They represent the great personalities of European and global history,

each of whom somehow moved the world and changed it for the better. The spirituality of the saints gives Charles Bridge a mystical aura, a sort of open-air temple enclosed by the bridge towers. The magic of Charles Bridge stands out especially at night, when the light of the gas lamps sculpts new events and relationships into the stone. It is then that Prague legends rise to the surface, with supernatural happenings, statues leaving their pedestals and going to the aid of humans.

The Clementinum Astronomical Tower and Baroque Library

Albert Einstein taught here, and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart played here numerous times. The Clementinum is Prague's second-largest building complex after Prague Castle and houses the most beautiful library in the world. Among the 27,000 old printed works, there are, for example, Kepler's writings with his handwritten dedication to his friends, the dean, and other professors at the Prague university. The Jesuits founded the Clementinum in 1556 and named it after the former Dominican monastery of St. Clement from 1227, where they settled. In 1775, meteorological data began to be collected here regularly; thus, Prague has the longest continuous series of meteorological observations in Europe.

Prague Castle The largest castle complex not only in the Czech Republic, but anywhere in the world, forms part of Prague's distinctive skyline. Stroll through the castle courtyards, see the Old Royal Palace, explore the Cathedral of Saints Vitus, Wenceslas and Adalbert, visit Saint George's Basilica, and wander down the picturesque Golden Lane. We also recommend a meander through the Royal Garden, where, besides its numerous enchanting nooks and crannies, you will come across Renaissance gems – the Ball Games Hall and Queen Anne's Summer Palace, also known as Belveder. Founded in the 9th century, Prague Castle became the seat of Bohemian kings and then Czech presidents and has been a symbol of the Czech state for more than a thousand years.

This is only a *fraction* of the many sites and activities Prague has to offer! Take the time to plan your own exploration with what interests you.

WELCOME LETTER

From the President

Welcome to the ISPP Prague 2025 Conference from ISPP President, Christopher M. Federico

Dear Colleagues,

I warmly welcome all of you to Prague for the 2025 Annual Meeting of the International Society of Political Psychology. Our yearly meeting is set to be one of our most successful and intellectually stimulating, though it takes place against a backdrop of heightened social and political strain. The theme of this year's meeting, "Social Identity, Political Conflict, and the Future of Democracy," will highlight many issues that concern us as both local and global citizens—and as scholars. Our meeting seeks to draw attention to ideas, theories, and current research on political and psychological processes addressing the intersection between different types of identity and the consequences of such intersection for democratic values and practice, with a practical and engaged eye to how we might protect robust, diverse democratic societies that have come under strain amid conflict and the rise of autocratic leaders. Political psychology, as all of you know, is well situated to address this critical nexus between identity, political conflict, and the future of democracy.

I would like to thank our 2025 conference chairs, Dr. Christina Farhart, Dr. Xiaowen Xu, and Dr. Andrea de Angelis for all of the hard work that made this event possible. They have worked diligently to assemble an engaging and timely program. I also thank the 30 distinguished scholars from around the world who served as chairs of our 12 conference sections, who spent many hours carefully reviewing this year's submissions. In this regard, we received an enormous number of submissions this year (1015 across all formats) and accepted 920 papers. With these submissions, our conference chairs and section chairs have assembled a program with approximately 170 sessions featuring scholars from multiple disciplines, hailing from across the globe. Our program also features engaging keynote addresses from two distinguished scholars from our Central European conference destination: Dr. Anna Kende of Eötvös Loránd University (Hungary), who will speak on "Fragile Identities in Politically Unstable Societies" in her address; and Dr. Martina Klicperova of the Czech Academy of Sciences (Czech Republic), who will give her address on the critical topic of "The Psychology of Democracy: A Matter of Life and Death." I invite all to attend these informative and timely addresses.

Our program also features three special-interest panels that will be of interest to many of you. The first is a memorial to Dr. James Liu, former editor of *Political Psychology* who sadly and unexpectedly passed away last summer. The second honors Dr. David Sears on his 90th birthday, with inspiration from a book chapter he wrote with reflections on political psychology from past presidents of ISPP. The third, organized by Dr. Klicperova, focuses on political

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psychology in the Czech Republic. Our program also features two highly-topical roundtables focused on engagement with Palestinian scholars and their communities, organized by Dr. Magdalena Bobowik, Dr. Johanna Vollhardt, and Dr. Emanuele Politi; and on the forthcoming *Handbook of Innovations in Political Psychology* organized by Dr. Christopher Karpowitz, Dr. Cara Wong, and Dr. Ethan Busby.

As usual, our Early Career Scholars Committee has organized multiple events centered on scholars who are within eight years of receiving their PhD. These include three roundtables focused on how to effectively communicate research as an early career scholar (“How to Talk About Your Research”), how to navigate the transition from PhD studies to subsequent academic employment (“Navigating Challenges as Early Career Researchers”), and on how to publish one’s dissertation research (“The Dissertation is Done, Now What?”). The Early Career Scholars Committee will also sponsor its two usual events. First up is the Mentoring Lunch, which will be held for confirmed attendees on 3 July from 1300-1430. This regular event pairs early-career scholars with senior ISPP members for an hour-and-a-half of mentoring regarding research, career success, and professional socialization with in political psychology. On behalf of ISPP, I thank the organizers of the Mentoring Lunch and all mentors who volunteered for the event this year. Second is the Early Career Scholars Social Hour, which is open to all early-career scholars and will be held on 4 July from 1805-1905. This event brings together PhD students and other early-career scholars to meet, socialize, and network with aim of encouraging community.

Our program also features several other events focused on challenges faced by scholars in the midst of political conflict, autocracy, and repression. The ISPP Scholars Under Threat Committee, which coordinates various initiatives to provide support for scholars whose freedom and opportunity to pursue their career are limited by their political and societal contexts, will hold its usual roundtable on 4 July from 1015-1130. This roundtable brings together scholars who are at work on ongoing global conflicts to discuss ways that political psychologists can engage with current social and political crises, with an eye to how these crises affect academic freedom and academic development. In addition, the ISPP Caucus of Concerned Scholars has organized a session on “Resilience, Recovery, and Political Trauma” in the context of current events and political psychologists’ attempts to come to grasp with them. I encourage you check out these important events.

I also invite all current members of ISPP to attend the customary Business Meeting on 5 July from 0800 to 0900. During this meeting, attendees will have the chance to learn about ISPP’s operations over the last year, ongoing ISPP developments, and upcoming meetings, events, activities sponsored by ISPP.

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We will also be holding our Awards Ceremony on 5 July from 1745 to 1845, where we will recognize distinguished achievements by ISPP members at all stages of their careers. Our awards recognize not only excellence in recent scholarship, but also enduring research and service contributions to political psychology. I wish to thank the chairs of the committees that reviewed nominations for our ten ISPP awards, along with the almost 20 different scholars who served on these committees. These include Dr. Darren Schreiber, chair of the Lifetime Achievement Award Committee (responsible for the Lasswell, Sanford, Knutson, and Sullivan Awards); Dr. Aleks Ksiazkiewicz, chair of the committee for the Sears Book Award and Markwell Media Award; Dr. Bethany Albertson, chair of the George Book Award committee; Dr. Mark Brandt, chair of the Sidanius Early Career Award committee; Dr. Becky Choma, chair of the Sigel Award Committee; and Dr. Carly Wayne, chair of the Best Dissertation Award committee. On behalf of ISPP, I also extend my thanks to everyone who took the time to submit nomination materials for these awards.

I would also like to welcome everyone to the social events and receptions that make up a central part of our annual meeting. These include the aforementioned Early Career Scholars Social Hour, but also the Welcome Reception on 3 July from 1805-1905 and the Awards Reception (following the Awards Ceremony) on 5 July from 1845 to 1945.

I would also like to welcome this year's 59 ISPP Academy Fellows to the three-day 2025 ISPP Academy. This is the last iteration of the Academy to be organized by Academy Director Dr. Gizem Arikan as her term ends. On behalf of ISPP as a whole, I want to thank Dr. Arikan for her many years of service and her enduring contributions to the success of the Academy. At the conclusion of our meeting, Dr. Monica Gerber (Universidad Diego Portales, Chile) will take over from Dr. Arikan as Academy Director. I thank Dr. Gerber for stepping into this essential role, one which is critical to the training of early career scholars in our discipline. I also wish to thank the diverse roster of scholars and ISPP members who have volunteered their time as speakers at this year's Academy: Yasin Koc (University of Groningen), Felicia Pratto (University of Connecticut), Nick Valentino (University of Michigan), Elizabeth Suhay (American University), Laura K. Taylor (University College Dublin), Gijs Schumacher (University of Amsterdam), Shawn Rosenberg (UC Irvine), and Iris Žeželj (University of Belgrade). Their service is also invaluable.

As we are meeting in one of Central Europe's great cities, I encourage attendees to take in all that Prague and its rich cultural heritage have to offer. Prague, 'The City of a Hundred Spires,' offers visitors numerous attractions, including the Old Town Square, the historic Charles Bridge and Prague Castle, and the Waldstein Palace. The city also features stunning examples of Gothic and Baroque architecture, including the St. Vitus Cathedral, Old New

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Synagogue, and the Saint Nicholas Church. Prague is also home to numerous engaging museums, including the National Museum, the Museum of Decorative Arts, the National Technical Museum, and the National Gallery. Among these are numerous specialty museums, including the Kafka Museum (devoted to the life and work of Franz Kafka) and the Karel Zeman Museum (devoted to the artistic and technical vision of pioneering Czech filmmaker Karel Zeman). There is something for all interests, and I encourage you to explore our host city.

I would like to end by thanking a number of individuals without which this conference and the success of ISPP in general would not be possible. These include the members of the ISPP Governing Council, who I thank wholeheartedly for their continued service since our last meeting in Santiago, Chile. They also—and very importantly—include ISPP Executive Director, Sev Bennett, and Executive Administrator, Minnie Chappell, in the Central Office. Without their diligent organizational and logistic work, this meeting and any number of other public goods provided by ISPP over the last year would not have been possible. Finally, I also would like to offer a word of thanks to all volunteers who have helped with the organization and execution of the conference in various roles.

I welcome all of you, and I wish you the best at our conference and in all of your endeavors thereafter until we see each other again.

Presidential Address: Making Sense of the Link(s) Between the Psychological and the Political: An Extended Belief-Systems Approach

Christopher M. Federico (University of Minnesota, USA)

How can we make sense of the enormous volume of research on the links between psychological variables and political preferences that has accumulated in recent years? In particular, how does ideology – or political preferences more generally – relate to psychological variables that reflect a tendency to be open versus closed? Answers to this question in political psychology have been varied. On one hand, much evidence suggests that individual difference variables that reflect high (versus low) needs for security and certainty predict conservative (versus liberal) preferences. On the other hand, some evidence suggests an extremism model: individuals on both the right and the left become defensive and rigid when the validity of their established commitments are threatened or challenged.

In an effort to reconcile these divergent sets of findings, I offer an extended belief systems approach to the relationship between psychological variables and political preferences in this talk. This approach suggests two principles. First, self-reported needs, traits, and motives (understood as individual differences) can become political belief-system elements (like ideological labels, partisan affiliations, issue positions, and value commitments)— which are governed by belief-systems principles. Second, belief systems, once formed, become central to the self and are thus valued and defended. The extended belief-systems approach argues that multiple processes link (different kinds of) psychological variables and political preferences. These include both (1) individual-difference factors or processes that govern the formation of symbolic political identifications and preference formation and (2) more-situational processes that reflect the defensive consequences of holding preferences that are central to the self-concept. After describing some general principles of this approach, I review current evidence and point toward unresolved questions that researchers interested in the link between psychological processes and political preferences need to attend to more carefully in future research.

Keynote 1: Fragile Identities in Politically Unstable Societies

Anna Kende (ELTE Eötvös Loránd University, Budapest, Hungary)

Social and political psychology often considers social relations within stable and long-standing democracies as a “default” context for human existence. However, for most people worldwide, especially in our turbulent era, reality is shaped by social and political tensions. These include nationalism, homophobia, prejudice against indigenous and immigrant communities, and the rise of populist, authoritarian, and illiberal politics that exploit these divisions. Political instability—characterized by low social cohesion and trust, lack of solidarity among citizens, and an inability to resist destabilization—may thus be a more common context of existence than stable liberal democracies.

Political instability can both result from and contribute to fragile collective identities. These identities arise from individual and collective historical experiences of conflict, structural inequalities, and the inability to reconcile with difficult collective memories. They are driven by a need for control in unpredictable social, political, and economic circumstances. As such, fragile identities play a critical role in fueling societal tensions and intergroup conflicts.

This talk will explore the dual impact of social, political, and historical contexts, as well as fragile identities, on intergroup relations, including attitudes, conciliatory preferences, collective action, and solidarity. It will draw on studies investigating the structural oppression of Roma people in Europe, intergroup conflicts in post-colonial societies, and the conditionality of solidarity with refugees in contexts characterized by political instability. These studies highlight the potential of social psychological research that considers the normative and contextual dimensions of intergroup relations, rather than focusing on individualistic solutions to collective problems.

Keynote 2: Psychology of Democracy: A Matter of Life and Death

Martina Klicperova-Baker (Institute of Psychology, Czech Academy of Sciences, Czech Republic)

Elections have consequences. Political regimes matter. Our world is speckled with zones of democracy and zones of dictatorship. They predetermine to a great degree our chances to live either civil, fulfilling, rich, and long life in a trustworthy community or a life which will likely be "solitary, poor, nasty, brutish and short," to quote T. Hobbes. Democracies increase chances for peace (*Pax democratica*); it can be applied both internationally and nationally: a) on the international level, the empirical law suggests that real democracies do not wage wars with each other; b) on the national level, it has been documented that democratic countries kill fewer of their own citizens than autocracies. Should not psychology be more involved in these matters? Let us search for ways to explain the mechanisms of democratic peace, analyze the many paradoxes of democracy, assess democratic political culture, create a network of "Psychology of Democracy," and search for additional ways how to make a difference.

Under the theme **Finding Common Ground in Uncertain Times**, we seek innovative research that illuminates how political psychology can help bridge divides and foster collaboration across diverse societies.

Across the globe, communities face unprecedented challenges—from escalating political polarization, climate crises, and public-health emergencies to rapid technological change and the spread of misinformation. These “uncertain times” test our capacity to engage constructively, negotiate conflict, and sustain pluralistic democratic norms. Political psychology, with its tools for understanding identity, cognition, emotion, and group dynamics, is uniquely poised to diagnose these fractures and design pathways toward shared understanding.

We particularly welcome submissions that address topics such as (but not limited to):

- **Intergroup trust & dialogue:** Psychological foundations of trust-building, empathy, and perspective-taking across ideological, ethnic, and national boundaries.
- **Polarization & persuasion:** Cognitive and affective mechanisms underlying political persuasion, echo chambers, and strategies for depolarization.
- **Collective resilience:** How social identities and collective narratives contribute to communities’ ability to adapt to crises (e.g., pandemics, climate disasters).

- **Deliberative & collaborative governance:** Psychological processes that support meaningful citizen participation, consensus-building, and integrative policy-making.
- **Leadership & mobilization:** Motivations, messaging, and behavioral dynamics of leaders, activists, and social movements seeking to either bridge or deepen societal divides.
- **Digital media & discourse:** The role of social platforms, algorithms, online networks and other in shaping political attitudes, norms of civility, and opportunities for constructive engagement.

All scholars—whether longstanding ISPP members or newcomers to the field—are encouraged to participate and contribute their unique perspectives. We invite theoretical, empirical, and methodological contributions—qualitative, quantitative, experimental, computational, and mixed methods alike. Interdisciplinary, comparative, and policy-oriented work is highly encouraged. Roberta Sigel Early Career Scholar Paper Award 2026

The Sigel Award is given to early career scholar authors of the best papers presented at annual meetings in a symposium, paper panel, or poster session.

ISPP first announced this award at its Vancouver meeting in 1996. Professor Sigel, whom the award honors, was a distinguished professor of political science at Rutgers University. She was the author and editor of seven books and many articles and book chapters, mostly in the areas of political socialization and democratic citizenship. She had many leadership roles in the American Political Science Association and has served as program chair, Vice-President and President of ISPP.

All ISPP early career scholars who are current dues paid members of ISPP and had their paper accepted for the 2025 Annual Meeting are eligible to be considered for the award to be presented during the 2026 meeting. Early career scholars are students (graduate or undergraduate) and faculty who received their Ph.D. within the last eight years. Each award carries a cash prize of \$250 USD.

There are two awards with slightly different criteria to accommodate the authorship and publication practices in the various disciplines represented in ISPP:

- The **first** (1) award is given to the best paper written by early career scholars only. in the case of multiple authors, all co-authors must be early career scholars.
- The **second** (2) award is conferred to the best paper with an early career scholar first author. This award allows for a senior scholar co-author.

Please nominate (self-nominations are encouraged) eligible papers only (note all submissions as papers; poster format submissions are not acceptable) and submit them to the email below by **January 15, 2026**. Papers previously submitted to the Sigel Award are not eligible. All submissions will be read by the award committee, consisting of members of the Early Career Committee as well as senior scholars. Two papers will be selected strictly according to scientific excellence and their contribution to research in political psychology.

The award will be presented at the ISPP 2026 Annual Meeting.

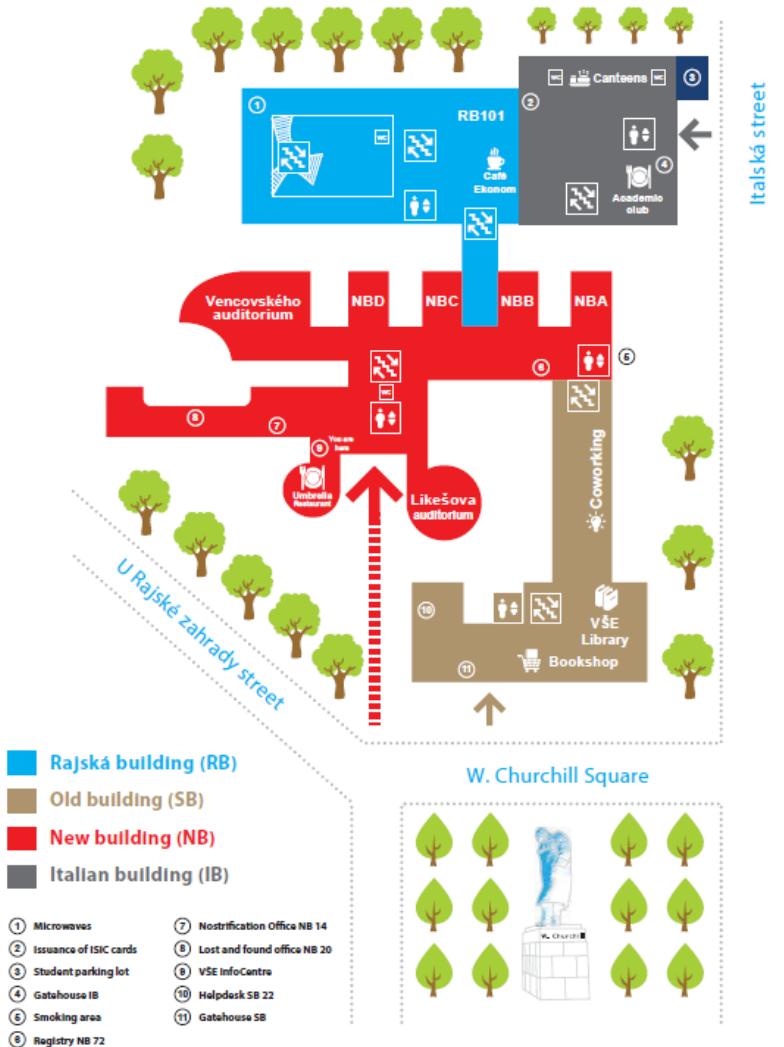

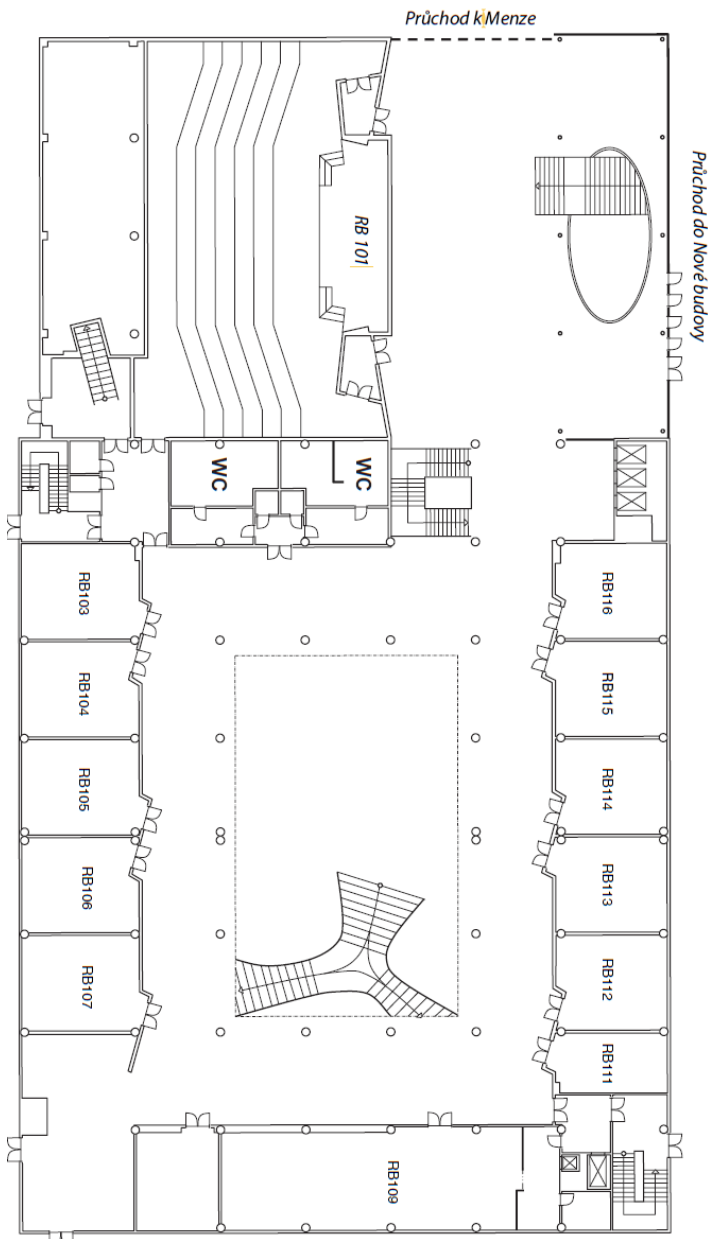

FLOOR PLANS RAJSKA BUILDING

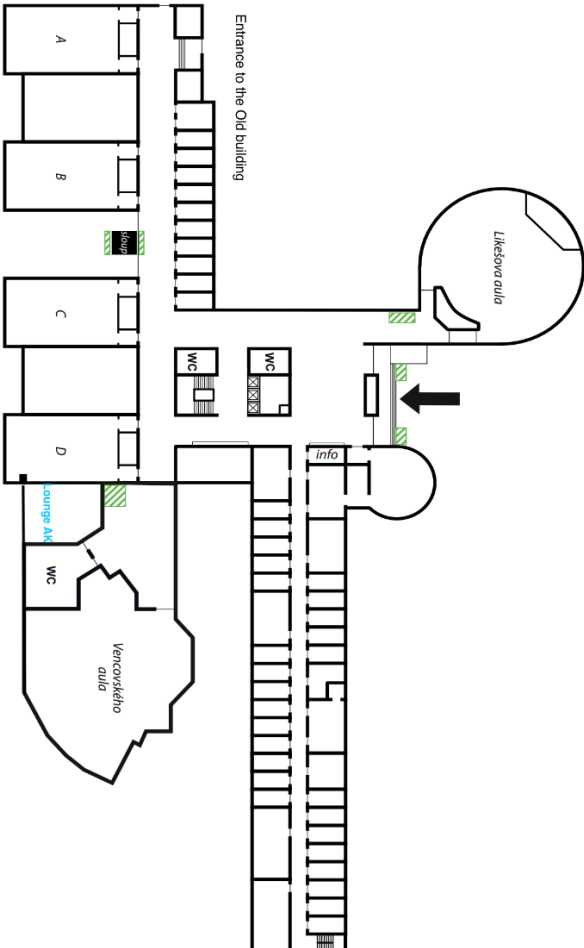


Entrance to the New building
